

Tree Warden Role Description Tree Surveyor

What is involved?

It is important to collect and record information about trees so that they can be properly protected and cherished. Surveys will focus on different aspects such as identifying ancient trees or looking for instances of tree diseases as well as trees which appear to be resistant to those diseases. Tree Surveyors can work individually or in small teams and they are free to choose their own lines of enquiry although it is hoped that these will align with current concerns as far as possible, especially tree health issues since diseases can wipe out whole populations. Tree Surveyors will pass on significant findings to interested parties, such as landowners, the City Council and the Ancient Tree Register.
